WHAT IS THE LEAGUE?

The CALIFORNIA LEAGUE OF CONSERVATION VOTERS is the campaign arm of the conservation movement in California. Its Board of Directors is drawn from all of the major environmental organizations in the state. It is nonpartisan, believing that concern for the environment transcends political parties. CLCV cooperates with both the national League of Conservation voters and a dynamic, expanding network of local LCV's to achieve its goals. CLCV is a registered campaign committee, and is the only conservation organization in California working full time on political campaigns.

OUR GOALS:

1. To elect to public office good people who will stand up and fight for the environment; to defeat those who consistently oppose environmental needs.
2. To inform the public of the performance and records of all public officials so that those who have been elected as conservationists continue to be responsive to our concerns.

OUR TOOLS:

VOTING CHART: This voting chart records the performance of the state legislature on conservation issues. The legislature is much more responsive to public concerns like the environment when it knows that an *informed* citizenry is watching its performance.

CAMPAIGN INFORMATION AND ENDORSEMENTS: CLCV endorses outstanding candidates for public office all over California, and publishes profiles of key candidates and races.

VOLUNTEERS: CLCV mobilizes grass-roots conservationists, trains them in campaign techniques, encourages them to work on behalf of good candidates in critical races, and to raise conservation issues in campaigns in their districts.

DONATIONS: The League solicits campaign contributions from conservationists all over the state, and uses them to help those good candidates in need of such funds. Even though these donations are small compared with the contributions of typical interests, through careful selection of races CLCV is able to make *the* difference in a number of campaigns. This is a significant accomplishment when one considers that business, for example, gave politicians over \$1.1 million in 1978, and conservationists, through the League, gave only \$20,000.

MEDIA INFORMATION

CLCV provides the public and the media with detailed progress reports on the legislature; in this way the public can compare the promises and statements of public officials with their actual performance. Public officials who work hard for the environment get credit for their effort; those who do not are held accountable by the voters.

ABOUT THIS CHART

This chart evaluates the 1979 session of the legislature. It lists votes cast, both in committee and on the floor, on key bills in land use, coastal protection, energy, pollution, water, parks and toxic substances. The scores for each legislator represent the percent of correct votes, excluding absences, with two exceptions. Absences which contributed to the defeat of a bill supported by conservationists are scored as wrong votes; absences or abstentions on bills opposed by conservationists are scored as correct votes, since they have the same effect as a vote against the bill.

pollution

SB 84 (Foran/Presley) Establishes a motor vehicle inspection and maintenance program to insure that cars on the road are meeting emission standards. Supported by environmentalists. Defeated on Senate floor.

SB 228 (Richardson) Weakens the Air Resources Board's authority to clean up the air by requiring legislative approval of the state's air pollution plans. Opposed by conservationists. Defeated in Assembly Resources Committee.

SB 901 (Holmdahl) Requires greater consideration of economic factors in setting state air pollution standards which are more stringent than federal standards. Opposed by conservationists. Pending in Assembly Resources.

SB 902 (Holmdahl) Makes it more difficult for the ARB to set air pollution standards providing an adequate safety margin for public health. Opposed by conservationists. Pending in Assembly Health Committee.

SB 903 (Holmdahl) Requires public hearings using cost/benefit analysis before setting air quality standards. Opposed by conservationists. Pending in Assembly Health Committee.

AB 195 (Torres) Requires pesticide manufacturers to tell the Department of Food and Agriculture when they have information that a pesticide poses a health risk. Defeated in Senate Agriculture Water Committee.

AB 300 (Mountjoy) Identical to SB 228 above. Defeated in Assembly Resources Committee and again on the floor.

This chart is only part of the story of the legislature; it does not show the important work behind the scenes that can contribute to the success or failure of a bill. Special thanks are due from conservationists to those Committee chairmen and members of the legislative leadership who have used their special influence on behalf of the environment. To supplement this chart, regularly read *Eco-Politics*, the League's quarterly newsletter.

AB 406 (Kapiloff) Bans the sale of beverages linked by non-degradable plastic rings which pose a threat to wildlife. Signed by Governor.

AB 681 (Greene) Establishes a program of research into alternative means of disposing of crop residues other than burning. Supported by conservationists. Killed in Assembly Resources.

AB 992 (Goggin) Designates the Air Resources Board and the Energy Commission as air pollution agencies responsible for regulating radioactive air pollutants. Defeated on Assembly floor.

AB 835 (Hart) Establishes a more effective and comprehensive program for the protection of California's Wild and Scenic River Waterway system. Supported by conservationists. Pending Senate Agriculture and Water Committee.

AB 990 (Kapiloff) Appropriates \$32 million from the Bagley Conservation Fund for state park acquisitions. Favored by conservationists. Pending Senate Resources Committee.

AB 1147 (Filante) Amends state water laws to provide for more efficient use of limited water supplies, and encourages water conservation. Supported by conservationists. Pending Senate Agriculture and Water Committee.

AB 1209 (Gage) Appropriates \$800,000 for an Agricultural Water Conservation Task force to study and make recommendations for agricultural water conservation.

land use & coastal

SB 39 (Cusanovich) Deletes one half of the Santa Monica mountains from the jurisdiction of the California Coastal Zone Act. Opposed by conservationists. Killed in Assembly Resources.

SB 82 (Garamendi) This bill was designed to amend the bi-state California/Nevada compact to provide stronger protection for Lake Tahoe. Conservationists supported the bill in Senate committee and the Assembly. The vote reported for the Senate floor is on an amendment, opposed by conservationists, to abolish the California Tahoe Regional Planning Agency. The bill has passed both houses but awaits favorable action by the Nevada legislature, which refused to pass a companion measure.

SB 175 (Cusanovich) Removes the Coastal Commission's power to condition approval of coastal development on dedications of property for public use. Opposed by conservationists. Killed in Senate Resources Committee.

SB 515 (Craven) Requires the state to bear financial responsibility for any crop losses due to a state or local government official mandate to use an environmentally sound integrated pest management procedure. Would encourage excessive use of chemical pesticides. Opposed by conservationists. Pending Assembly Resources Committee.

SB 664 (Nielson) Eliminates present legal requirements that reclaimed swamp and overflow lands are subject to the public right to use such wetlands and waterways for navigation, fishing, recreation and as open space. Eliminates public access to and

environmental protection of thousands of acres, especially in San Francisco Bay. Opposed by conservationists. Pending Assembly Resources Committee.

SB 779 (Dills) Would eliminate single-family homes from the jurisdiction of the Coastal Commission. Opposed by conservationists. Killed in Assembly Resources Committee.

AB 13 (Papan) Removes an area in the Santa Monica Mountains surrounded on three sides by state park from the jurisdiction of the Coastal Commission. Opposed by conservationists. Passed both Houses, but agreement was not reached on a final version.

AB 101 (Hayes) Permits diversion of fees from purchase of personalized license plates into the off-highway vehicle fund for use by off-road vehicles. Opposed by conservationists. Vetoed by Governor.

AB 367 (Waters) Appropriates \$250,000 for the best available temporary measures for protecting and maintaining the Negit Island gull rookery in Mono Lake. Signed by the Governor.

AB 462 (Mello) At various times this bill made a variety of different changes in the Coastal Act. The votes reported are in Senate and Assembly Committee on versions of the bill which deleted environmentally important areas from the Coastal Zone, and which were opposed by conservationists. In its final form, as signed by the Governor, the bill was not opposed by conservationists.

energy

SB 4 (Rains) Establishes a mandatory 5¢ refund on beer and soft drink containers. Supported by conservationists. Pending on Senate floor.

SB 16 (Roberti) Creates a State Assistance Fund for implementation of alternative energy systems by small businesses or qualified alternative energy businesses. Pending Assembly floor.

SB 117 (Campbell) Abolishes the Energy Commission and transfers its functions to the Public Utilities Commission. Opposed by conservationists. Pending Assembly Resources Committee.

SB 566 (Rains) Utilizes an existing \$200,000 fund to solarize low and moderate income housing. Prohibits permits for swimming pool heating systems unless they include solar energy. Assembly version mandates solar only where cost-effective. Supported by conservationists. Pending Assembly floor.

SB 778 (Keene) Abolishes the Energy Commission and creates a State Department of Energy which, together with the PUC, would take over the duties of the present Energy Commission. Opposed by conservationists. Pending Assembly Resources Committee.

SB 801 (Russell) Removes the Energy Commission's authority to implement load management programs to reduce the need for new power plants. Opposed by conservationists. Pending in Assembly Resources Committee.

SB 946 (Sieroty) Prohibits installation of non-solar swimming pool heating systems. Killed in Senate Energy Committee.

SB 1183 (Garamendi) Directs the State Office of Emergency Services to develop an emergency plan for the worst possible nuclear accident, a core meltdown in an operating reactor. Supported by conservationists. Signed by Governor.

SB 1184 (Garamendi) Requires placement of off-site radiation monitors to detect radiation releases from nuclear power plants. Killed in Senate Energy Committee.

SB 1185 (Garamendi) Requires the development of notification procedures for potential nuclear accidents occurring in nuclear power plants. Killed in Senate Energy Committee.

SB 1205 (Roberti) Originally provided \$150 million for an Energy Development Authority to fund utility loans for solar installations by homeowners and small businesses, to fund industrial applications of solar energy. Later reduced to \$10 million. Pending Assembly Resources Committee.

SB 1206 (Roberti and Alquist) A \$500 million bond issue for the June, 1980 ballot to finance SB 1205. Also pending in Assembly Resources Committee.

SB 1209 (Foran) Allows the sale in California of gasoline with a higher volatility than required by air pollution regulations, thus increasing overall smog levels. Opposed by conservationists. Defeated on Assembly floor.

SB 1210 (Foran) Increases allowable levels of lead in gasoline sold in California. Opposed by conservationists. Killed on Assembly floor.

AB 900 (Göggin) Provides \$20 million in conservation loans and grants to local governments, schools and hospitals. Signed by Governor.

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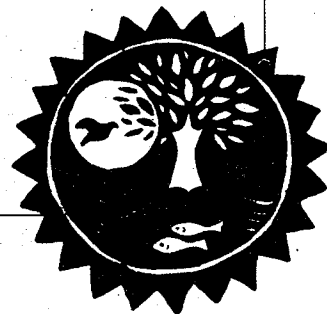
