WHAT IS THE LEAGUE?

The CALIFORNIA LEAGUE OF CONSERVATION VOTERS is the campaign arm of the conservation movement in California. Its Board of Directors is drawn from all of the major environmental organizations in the state. It is nonpartisan, believing that concern for the environment transcends political parties. CLCV cooperates with both the national League of Conservation voters and a dynamic, expanding network of local LCV's to achieve its goals. CLCV is a registered campaign committee, and is the only conservation organization in California working full time on political campaigns.

OUR GOALS:

1. To elect to public office good people who will stand up and fight for the environment; to defeat those who consistently oppose environmental needs.
2. To inform the public of the performance and records of all public officials so that those who have been elected as conservationists continue to be responsive to our concerns.

OUR TOOLS:

VOTING CHART: This voting chart records the performance of the state legislature on conservation issues. The legislature is much more responsive to public concerns like the environment when it knows that an *informed* citizenry is watching its performance.

CAMPAIGN INFORMATION AND ENDORSEMENTS: CLCV endorses outstanding candidates for public office all over California, and publishes profiles of key candidates and races.

VOLUNTEERS: CLCV mobilizes grass-roots conservationists, trains them in campaign techniques, encourages them to work on behalf of good candidates in critical races, and to raise conservation issues in campaigns in their districts.

DONATIONS: The League solicits campaign contributions from conservationists all over the state, and uses them to help those good candidates in need of such funds.

CANVASS: Operating from offices in San Francisco, Mountain View and, starting this spring, in Los Angeles, CLCV voter education teams visit hundreds of thousands of voters each year, informing them about critical environmental issues and candidates.

MEDIA INFORMATION

CLCV provides the public and the media with detailed progress reports on the legislature; in this way the public can compare the promises and statements of public officials with their actual performance. Public officials who work hard for the environment get credit for their effort; those who do not are held accountable by the voters.

About This Chart

This chart evaluates the 1981 session of the legislature. It lists votes cast, both in committee and on the floor, on key bills in land use, coastal protection, energy, pollution, water, parks and toxic substances. The scores for each legislator represent the percent of correct votes, excluding absences, with two exceptions. Absences which contributed to the defeat of a bill supported by conservationists are scored as wrong votes; absences or abstentions on bills opposed by conservationists are scored as correct votes, since they have the same effect as a vote against the bill.

This chart is only part of the story of the legislature; it does not show the important work behind the scenes that can contribute to the success or failure of a bill. Special thanks are due from conservationists to those Committee chairmen and members of the legislative leadership who have used their special influence on behalf of the environment. To supplement this chart, regularly read *Eco-Politics*, the League's quarterly newsletter.



Air Pollution and Toxics

AB 69 (Tanner) Creates a California Hazardous Substances Safety Fund to provide for the cleanup of abandoned dumpsites and provide compensation to people harmed by toxic chemicals. Supported by conservationists, these funds would apply to those sites not covered by federal funds. Pending in Senate Health and Welfare Committee.

AB 1005 (Duffy) Grants authority to the Air Resources Board for setting and enforcing standards for toxic airborne pollutants. Although amendments added by the Consumer Protection and Toxic Materials Committee weakened it somewhat, environmentalists continue to support the bill. Pending in Senate Government Organization Committee.

AB 2000 (Sher) Increases civil penalties from \$500 to \$1000 per day for air pollution violations in the San Francisco Bay Area. Supported by environmentalists. Signed by the Governor.

SB 33 (Presley) Provides a vehicle inspection and maintenance program for annual emission inspections of all 1969 and later model cars. Although severely weakened by Transportation Committee amendments, subsequent amendments corrected most of

the damage and environmentalists once again support the bill. Now pending in Assembly Transportation Committee.

SB 91 (Maddy) Eliminates oversight authority of the Air Resources Board in relatively pristine areas, thus blocking proposals to give more stringent air pollution protection to 30 state parks, wilderness areas, and national monuments. Environmentalists believe areas which have clean air now should be given a high level of protection, and so oppose this measure. Pending in Assembly.

SB 274 (Foran) Exempts transit district buses from compliance with California air pollution standards. Environmentalists opposed this bill because it could result in a 2% increase in NOx emissions statewide. Became law without Governor's signature.

SB 788 (Presley) Creates a "mini-superfund" to provide for cleanup of dumpsites and toxic spills, specifies liability for toxic polluters, and provides for research at the University of California. Supported by environmentalists, it is now in the inactive file.



Land Use and Coastal

AB 893 (Roos) Establishes a new California Communities Commission having authority to bypass local zoning and planning laws in order to stimulate construction. Conservationists opposed this bill which was eventually vetoed by the Governor.

AB 914 (Roos) Unmerges small residential lots merged by cities to prevent strain on services and environment. Opposed by conservationists. To Governor.

AB 1600 (Sher) Amends Timber Operation and Penalty's Act relating to forest practices. Exempts a professional forester from filing a harvesting plan and allows him to instead file a timber management plan. Supported by conservationists. Sent to inactive file.

AB 2074 (Robinson) Provides a window during which landowners may escape from Williamson Act contracts if certain conditions are met. Opposed by conservationists. Signed by Governor.

SB 214 (Maddy) Would have prohibited the State Public Works Board from purchasing Gill-Mustang Ranch as an addition to Henry Coe State Park. Conservationists opposed this measure as the larger park could provide excellent recreational opportunities near major urban centers. In late August the Board voted unanimously to buy the ranch.

SB 493 (Carpenter) Eliminates the Coastal Commission's jurisdiction over the Bolsa Chica wetlands in Huntington Beach, and binds the state to a 1973 land exchange agreement which would involve construction of a navigable opening to the sea and two land bridges. Conservationists oppose this bill as it would lead the way for intensive development. Pending in Assembly Energy and Natural Resources Committee.

SB 720 (Greene) Eliminates C.E.Q.A. as a basis for review of timber harvest plans, leaving little consideration of the environmental impacts of timber operations. Environmentalists oppose this measure as it could have a significant effect on the fisheries and rivers of California. Pending in Assembly Energy and Natural Resources Committee.

SB 836 (Boatwright) Expands ability of a local agency to cancel a land conservation contract as a legislative determination. Opposed by environmentalists. Pending in Assembly Energy and Natural Resources Committee.

SB 909 (Keene) Prohibits the California Coastal Commission from permitting any offshore oil and gas development of areas in Lease Sale #53 for either four years, or until it is shown that development can be carried out in a manner consistent with the Coastal Act. Conservationists supported this bill which was killed on the Senate Floor.



Rivers

AB 1200 (McCarthy) Provides for the sale of bonds to create a fund to be used for the control and prevention of water pollution and for water reclamation. Supported by conservationists. Pending on Senate Floor.

AB 1354 (Berman) Ensures preservation of the South Fork of the American River between Che-Bar and Folsom Reservoir for seven and one-half years. Would prohibit the planning of dams on this portion until July 1981. Supported by conservationists. Sent to inactive file.

ACR 6 (Waters) Supports the El Dorado Irrigation District's project on the South Fork of the American River, which includes a diversion facility and several dams, and directs agencies to issue water rights. Opposed by environmentalists. Passed both houses.

SJR 24 (Johnson) Memorializes the President and Congress to expedite funding so that construction on the Auburn Dam may conclude as soon as possible. Opposed by conservationists. Pending in Assembly Floor.



Energy

AB 784 (Bosco) Makes various supplemental and technical changes in Energy Tax Credit Provisions. Conservationists support. Signed by Governor.

AB 1002 (Wright) Appropriates funds for analysis of economic impacts of the Energy Commission's Biennial Report. Conservationists oppose this measure because the analysis would fail to address the problem of overestimating energy needs. Sent to interim study by Senate Energy and Public Utilities Committee.

SB 351 (Foran) Weakens the energy efficient building standards authority of the Energy Commission, which would cause long delays in the current building standards adoption process. Opposed by conservationists. Shelved by the author.

SB 921 (Robert) Establishes a Solar Energy Conservation Mortgage Corp. to facilitate funding of energy conservation measures and structural improvements. Supported by conservationists. Signed by Governor.
